No one is allowed to enter the facility after closing or before opening without authorization from a school official. Administration personnel and specified faculty members are responsible for the opening and closing procedures. The building landlord employs an evening security service to patrol the campus after hours. The maintenance staff ensures the building is empty and locked at night.

Pacific does not employ security personnel to monitor activities inside the building or in the parking area. Each student and employee is encouraged to be vigilant of criminal activity and to report any such activity or other emergency to the local law enforcement agency, or call 911 immediately and to alert a member of the administration of the activity as soon as possible. "PCOM Campus Crime Incident Report" Forms should be completed and are available in the Student Lounge during all open campus hours or from the Administrative Receptionist, Monday through Friday. The Chief Administration Officer keeps a written log of such activity.

When notified of any criminal activity, the administrator will report the activity to the local law enforcement agency where reportable, and if not reported already. The college will work with local law enforcement to resolve any crime or emergency and will alert the campus community of safety issues that may arise. During the school orientation, new students will be informed about campus security procedures and policies and will be encouraged to be responsible for their own security and the security of others. In the event of any criminal activity or emergency local law enforcement officials should be contacted by calling 911.

Pacific College of Oriental Medicine Sexual Assault Policy

In compliance with the Higher Education Amendments of 1992, Pacific has developed this policy to promote the awareness of potential sex offenses. It is required to make all students, faculty and staff aware of potential criminal activity and to watch out for each other.

The nature of the campus does not require hired security services. However, in the event that a crime does occur on campus, Pacific endorses a reporting policy that strongly encourages victims to report all crimes to local police at once, regardless of the nature. Reporting of a crime ensures that appropriate action can be taken. Crimes can be reported in person, or by calling the police department any time of day or night.

If you are sexually assaulted:

Go to a safe place. Ask a friend to stay with you.

Call 911.

Do not wash, change clothes or douche before calling or going for help.

Do not touch any evidence of a struggle even if the assault took place in your room or home.

A member of the administrative staff should also be notified. In the event that administrative staff is not available, a member of the faculty can be notified. All reports made by victims to Pacific College staff and faculty is held in strict confidence. Information will only be given to other persons or agencies upon written consent.

Pacific College of Oriental Medicine Statement on Substance Abuse

A. General Information

Each student must obey civil and criminal laws. In addition, each student must refrain from using, possessing, or distributing alcoholic beverages, narcotics, or illegal drugs while on campus. Students should be aware that possession, use or distribution of drug and alcohol substances on campus violates the law. Penalties include substantial fines and/or imprisonment. In addition, students will lose their eligibility to receive federal student aid if they are convicted of any drug offense that occurs while enrolled. Students are also ineligible for financial aid if they fail to answer any drug-related question on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

B. Violations

PCOM may impose discipline for violation of PCOM policy. Such violations include the following types of misconduct.

1. Use, possession, sale, distribution, or manufacture of, or the attempted sale of repeat use, possession, sale, distribution, or manufacture of the following on PCOM properties
 - a) Controlled substances identified in federal and state law or regulations, except as expressly permitted by law; or
 - b) Illegally obtained controlled substances.
2. Use, possession, sale, distribution, or manufacture of alcohol on PCOM properties that is unlawful or otherwise prohibited by campus regulations.

C. Health Risks Associated with Substance Abuse

Substance abuse may result in a wide spectrum of extremely serious health and behavioral problems. Substance abuse results in both short and long-term effect upon the body and mind. There are specific health risks related to impairment and addiction. Alcohol and drugs are toxic to the body's systems. In addition to the problem of toxicity, contaminate poisonings often occur with illegal drug use. HIV infection associated with intravenous use is a prevalent hazard.

Acute health problems may include heart attack, stroke and sudden death which in the case of some drugs such as cocaine can occur after first-time use. Long lasting health effects of drugs and alcohol may include disruption of normal heart rhythm, high blood pressure, leaks of

blood vessels in the brain, bleeding and destruction of brain cells and permanent memory loss, infertility, impotency, immune system impairment, kidney failure, cirrhosis of the liver and pulmonary damage. Drug use during pregnancy may result in fetal damage and birth defects causing hyperactivity, neurological abnormalities, and developmental difficulties.

D. Safety and Performance

Students with substance abuse and dependency problems create excessive safety risks for themselves, their colleagues, and others. A person who is mentally or physically impaired because of drug or alcohol use may behave in careless and unsafe ways. In addition, substance abuse may noticeably affect a student's performance, which may, over time, decline in quality. Such students tend to have unusually high accident rates and are usually absent or tardy more frequently than others.

E. Highlights from the Laws

There are numerous local, state, and federal statutes and ordinances related to the manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, and/or use of a controlled substance of alcohol. These statutes impose legal sanctions for both felony and misdemeanor convictions related to violation of applicable laws and ordinances.

Drugs considered to be controlled substances are listed in Schedule I through V of the Controlled Substances Act (29 U.S.S. 812), and are further defined by regulations 21 CFR 1308.11 through 1308.15.
