2 “Number of Graduates” is the number of students who completed the program within 100% of the published program length.

3 “Graduates available for employment” means the number of graduates minus the number of graduates unavailable for employment. “Graduates unavailable for employment” means graduates who, after graduation, die, become incarcerated, are called to active military duty, are international students that leave the United States or do not have a visa allowing employment in the United States, or are continuing their education in an accredited or bureau-approved postsecondary institute.

4 “Graduates employed in the field” means graduates who report that they are gainfully employed within six months of graduation in a position for which the skills obtained through the education and training provided by the institution are required or provided a significant advantage to the graduate in obtaining the position.

5 Placement Rate is calculated by dividing the number of graduates gainfully employed in the field by the number of graduates available for employment.

*Graduates did not report any data on hours worked per week.

However, the 2010 median pay for “Massage Therapist,” according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics*, was \$34,900 per year and \$16.78 per hour.
